There on the table next to a cup of wine and bread, they watch the candle flames flickering. "I wonder why light is so important for Shabbat?" said Siân.




As the family and friends feast on special foods, Nathan and Rachel begin to explain why light is so important for Shabbat.



Nathan and Rachel tell Aled and Siân about the story of creation in the Torah. There God created light first of all.



Then God created sky, earth and sea which were filled with many living creatures, plants and people.



For six days God created and everything that God made was good. On the seventh day God rested and made that day holy.



Then God gave Moses the Ten Commandments on Mount Sinai, and the fourth commandment is to keep Shabbat, the seventh day, holy.



"For six days you shall do your work, but on the seventh day you shall rest," the Torah says.



During Shabbat Nathan and Rachel stop, remember, and give thanks to God for creation and their time together as a family.



Aled and Siân join in the songs, stories and chatter after the meal has ended. "Tomorrow at dusk," said Nathan and Rachel, "we also light a special candle to say goodbye to Shabbat!"
