What can you see on the mantelpiece? Why is the Hanukkah menorah there?



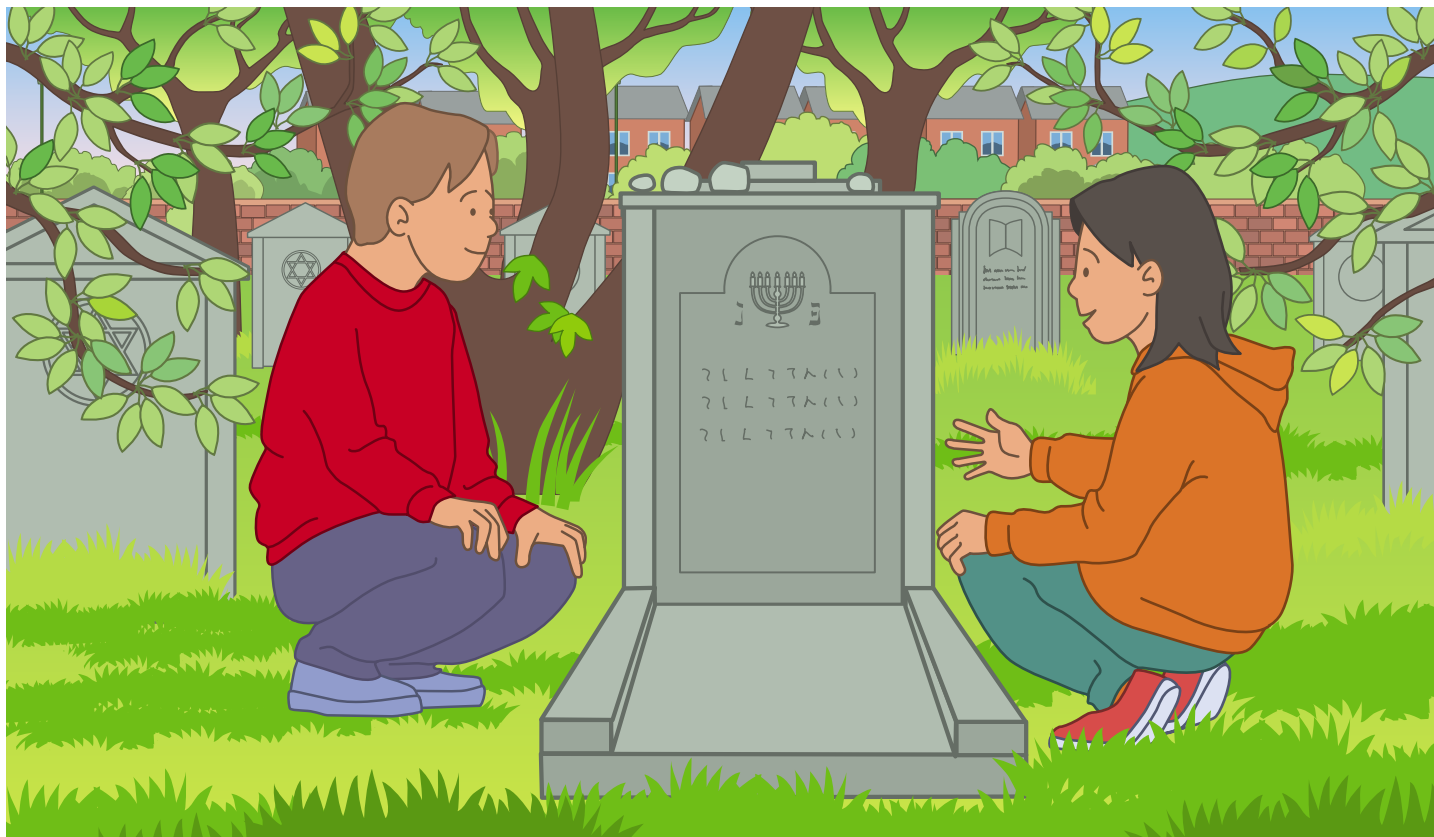
Who are the people you can see in the picture?

Where have you seen memorials like the one in the picture? Why is the menorah there?



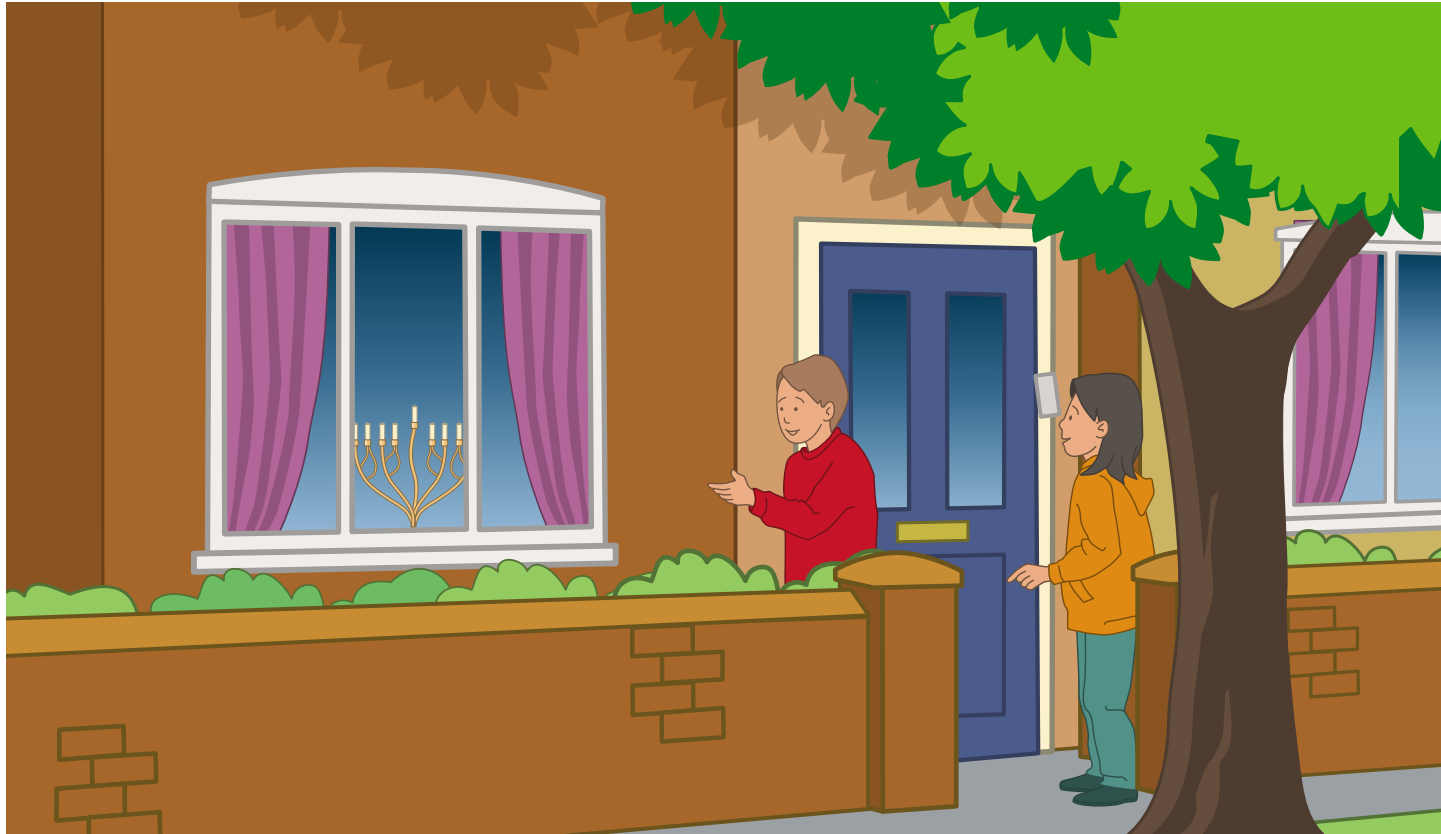
What do you think Aled and Siân saw in the music shop window?

Can you see where the lamp is burning? Why is it there?



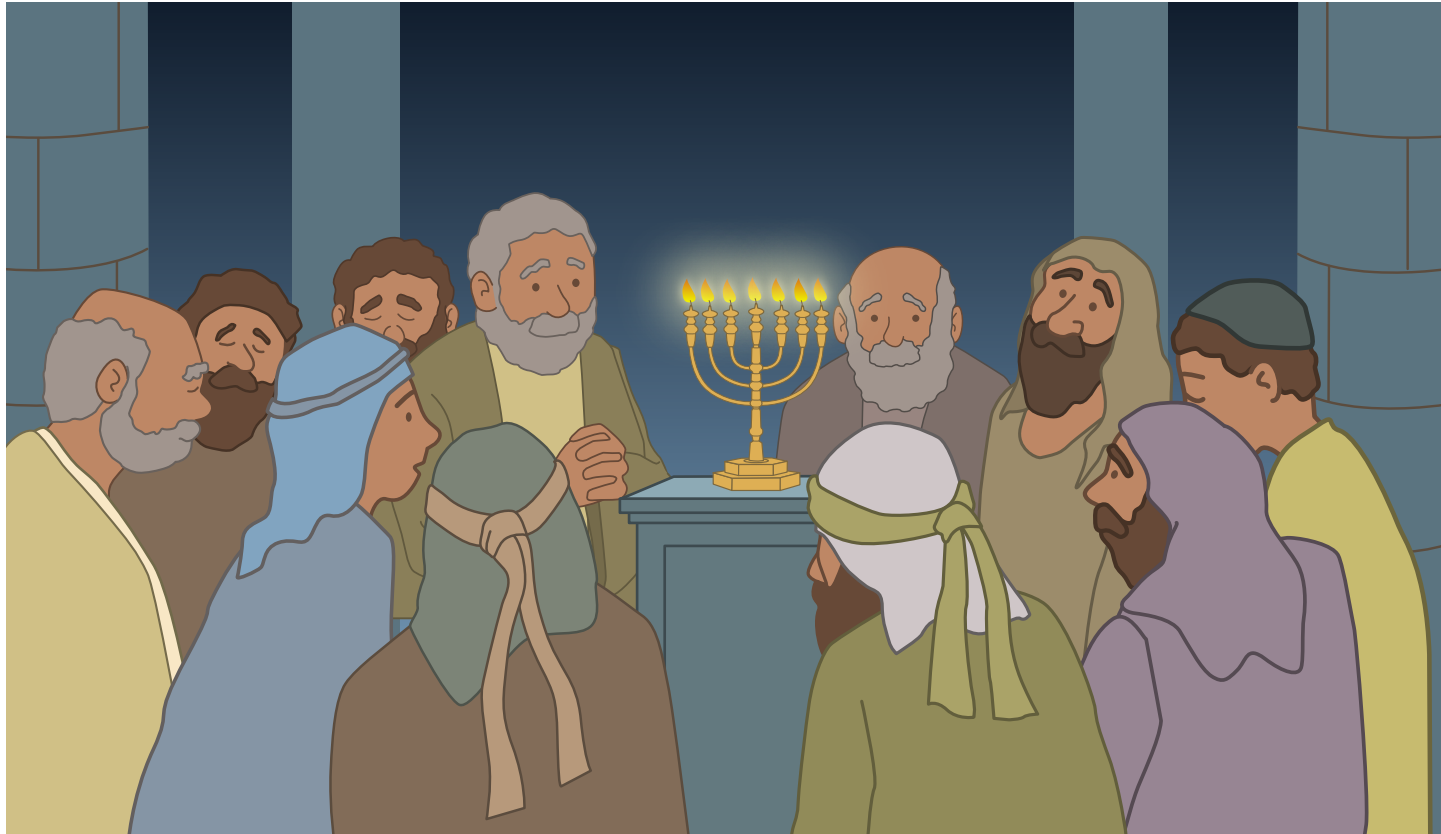
