<b>Experience</b>	
<p>For more than thirty years the Arthur Rank Centre has been the focus or location for all the work undertaken. Work has been conducted in several European countries and the USA as well as the UK. The Arthur Rank Centre is a partnership between the Churches, Rank Foundation and the Royal Agricultural Society for England dedicated as a charity to the well being of rural people.</p> <p>My ministry in the Church has enabled me to take a series of initiatives with policy implications for the whole community. During the 1980s while based in Bristol I set up and had responsibility for a large employment generation programme funded through the Manpower Services Commission, employing and finding fulltime work for over 2000 people during my time as chairman. In that same period I helped establish the largest Enterprise Agency outside London and the only one in the UK that operated without external subsidy (The New Work Trust Company). This enabled us to provide advice and training to the members of the Conservative Government Cabinet on the needs of the small business sector.</p> <p>During that same period I was chairman of Avon Community Council and of its subsidiary Avon Community Council (Training) Ltd which ran an influential Youth Training Scheme in Central Bristol providing building services to village and community halls in rural Avon.</p> <p>I helped establish ACRE as an independent charity, separating it out of the NCVO's Rural Department. ACRE is the lead body concerned with rural community development. The Arthur Rank Centre works closely with ACRE and has included ACRE on the Board of the Hidden</p>	

Britain company that was established to run the work of the community-led sustainable tourism project Hidden Britain Centres, which I conceived and developed. The pilot project was funded by the DTI Small Business Service, and DEFRA funded one of the regional sub-projects.

The Archbishop of Canterbury invited me to be executive secretary of the Archbishops' Commission on Rural Areas whose report in 1990, "Faith in the Countryside" had a formative influence in Church, State and community action. This led to my appointment as the first national rural officer for the Church of England with responsibility which included the shaping of policy and leading the Church in its connection with Government on rural affairs.

The opportunity for churches to serve their communities as multi-functional facilities encouraged me to set up Rural Churches in Community Service – a project which was awarded £2.5m by the Millennium Commission to adapt 100 churches for this purpose. This project has proved an inspiration to many others to do the same.

The magazine "Country Way" was started by me 18 years ago to provide a quality publication to provide ideas, information and inspiration for rural people and their churches. It remains unrivalled in this field.

## Research Interests

Over the past twenty years the effectiveness of the Church in rural areas has been the main focus with research leading to publications on aspects of the work and life of the rural Church. More recently involvement in the Rural Stress Action Plan led to research into the role of the rural micro business as a contributor to awareness of stress and its relief among rural people; a Defra grant was received for this work, published in 2003.

Research led by Coventry University, funded by Defra, focused on the contribution of rural faith communities to community vibrancy. The report of this research, "Faith in rural communities" was published in October 2006.

Lead on a research project in 2007 for Farm Crisis Network on the impact of inspection regimes on farmers in Wales was funded by the EU through Healthy Minds at Work.

The Centre for Studies in Rural Ministry (a partnership between the Arthur Rank Centre and St Mary's Centre in association with the University of Warwick) contributes to an MA programme in which students apply a range of research methods to respond to research questions generated within their own working contexts.
